


#### **BACKGROUND ON YEMEN'S** PEACE AND TRANSITION PROCESS (2011-2015)

The Gulf Cooperation Council Initiative was a political transition process launched in the wake of large-scale protests in Yemen. Beginning with an elite deal, a Government of National Unity was formed, followed by new presidential elections, then a National Dialogue and a constitution-drafting process. An escalation in violence in 2015, however, effectively brought the process to an end.



- Women's representation in the ND process
- The draft constitution included a 30% quota for women in all state authorities
- 14 articles in the draft Constitution reference women. Provisions regarding women's rights include a minimum age for marriage of 18, full and equal legal status for women, and a ban on discrimination against women in public service employment
